Highlights:

- The presenters reminded the Gffat, as part of the implementation of the University's Academic Plan, an Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) Dashboard has been developed. The dashboard will be accessible bynembers of the University community will also used to produce reports related to the University'sprogressowards improving EDI
- The presentershen gave a demonstration of the EDI Dashboard website
- The presenters reported that the EDI Dashboard can filter the data by the four federally designated EDI categories (men, persons with disabilities, Indigenous peoples members of visible minorities, and that the University will soon add a fifth category, sexual orientation
- Discussion included:
 - o The addition of a metric for "presence in a leadership role" would be valuable
 - Some data should not be made available on the DI Dashboard if there is risk that
 individuals could be identified. The presenters noted that the EDI Dashboard will contain
 flags to indicate when data has been removed or when sample sizes are too small and
 information is limited

9. International Strategy Progress Report

Documentation for this item was circulated with the Agenda. Dru Marshall Jammaka Ruwanpura presented this item.

Highlights:

- The presenter provided an update on the implementation of the four strategic goals in the University'sInternational Strategy (IS), including:
 - The University has surpassed its targets for increasing the undergraduate and graduate international student populations
 - The top three countries of origin for the University's international students are China (23%),India (14%) and Iran (7%). The University attracts students from a broad range of countries, and has a more diverse international student population than many other institutions.
 - The number of students obtaining an international learning experience lower in 2018-2019, primarily because student exchange programs are not as popular as they used to be. Research placemental work experience numbers aute, however.
 - The number of aculty members with at least one degree risented outside of Canadaas risento 49%
 - The University has earned two innovation awards for its International Partnership Assessment Rating Index tool, which tracks the nature of the University's active international partnerships. Of the University's 23/4tiveinternational partnerships with 55 countries in 2018/2019, nine involved all three forms of partnership (mobility, research, and academic programs and collaborations)
 - The number of publications arising from international collaborations continues to steadily increase as does theunding received from international research sponsoring agencies

 In the time since the IS was approved in 2013, 480 students have been involved in 11 international development projects

• Discussion included:

- The IS Dashboard presents data on the number of life of members who have obtained education internationally, but does not present data on the number of postdoctoral scholars with international training. The presenter reported that data on the internationality of postdoctoral scholars is collected.
- In response to a question, the presenters reported that the University's Latin American Research Centre has been closed for budgetary reasons, but individual connections will continue and any agreements can be amended through the Dean's office
